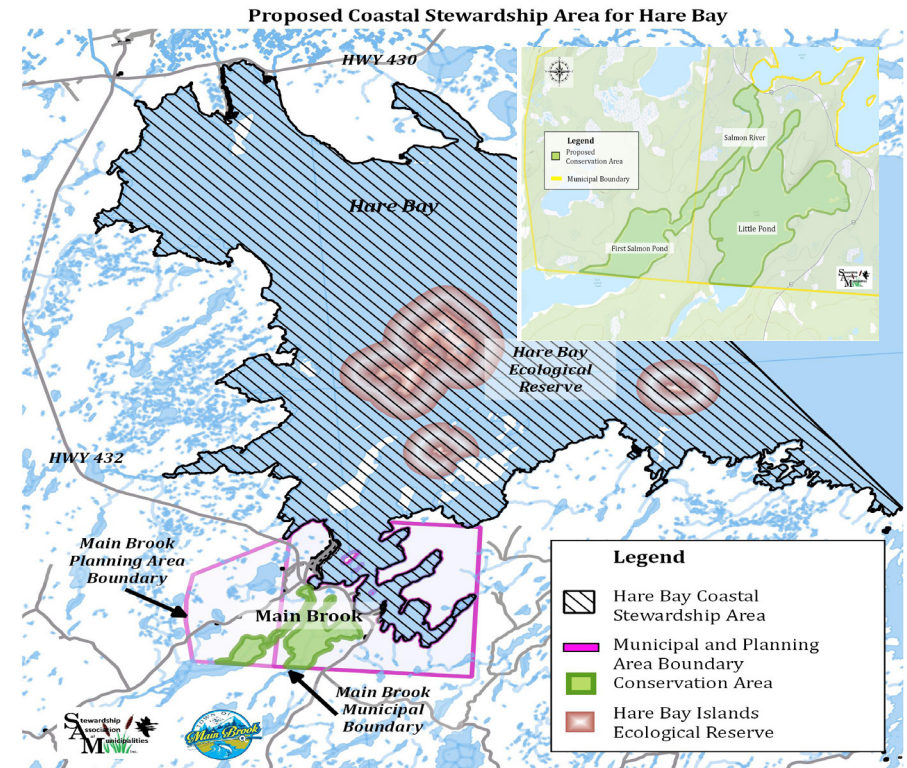


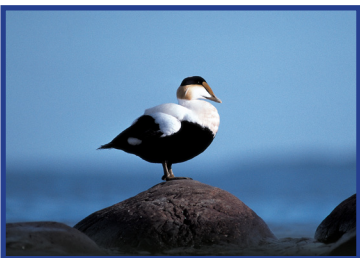
Main Brook Municipal Habitat Stewardship Agreement

The Town of Main Brook and the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador signed a **MUNICIPAL HABITAT STEWARDSHIP AGREEMENT** in May 2021, committing to the conservation and enhancement of wildlife habitat within the town's planning boundaries.

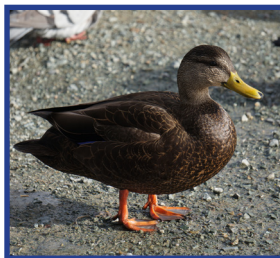
The agreement designates portions of Salmon River found within the town's planning boundaries as a Conservation Area, including First Salmon Pond and Little Pond.

Residents and visitors alike know Main Brook to be a world-class fishing destination. The waterway is known as “Salmon River,” as well as the ponds that feed into it (“First Salmon Pond” and “Little Pond”) are scheduled salmon rivers that flow into Hare Bay and support a number of other species (e.g. brown trout, waterfowl) as well.

The town also recognized its role in conserving the seabird nesting islands in Hare Bay, in particular nest and brood rearing habitat for the Common Eider. The Hare Bay Stewardship Zone encompasses a number of these Islands and simply reflects an area in which residents would like to undertake sustainable land use actions which support the continued presence of these seabird populations.
